SACRED PASCHAL TRIDUUM

The Meaning

The great Orthodox liturgical theologian, Fr. Alexander Schmemann, reflected on that fact that the Triduum - beginning at the close of the Holy Thursday Liturgy and continuing through Good Friday, Holy Saturday, the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday – reveals more to us about the core doctrines of the Church (including the creation, fall, redemption, Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ) than any other experience we can have, because this great prayer allows us to fully enter through powerful ritual into these mysteries. We do not need them explained, because in this great prayer we both witness and participate in "one all-embracing Event from which stems everything else: understanding and power, knowledge and iov. contemplation and communion."

To pray this liturgy is to walk with Jesus and the disciples on a profound journey. It is a path that allows us to more deeply embrace our Baptism, the fullness of being a member of the Body of Christ. It is an "Amen" to the Lord, who went freely to his Death and in whose Resurrection the world is redeemed.

All of this is essential if we are to be people

who can carry his message to the world. Pope Francis reminds us that he is our model and his manner our goal:

Jesus himself is the model of this method of evangelisation which brings us to the very heart of his people. How good it is for us to contemplate the closeness which he shows to everyone! ... Jesus' sacrifice on the cross is nothing else than the culmination of the way he lived his entire life. Moved by his example, we want to enter fully into the fabric of society, sharing the lives of all, listening to their concerns, helping them materially and spiritually in their needs, rejoicing with those who rejoice, weeping with those who weep; arm in arm with others, we are committed to building a new world.... Jesus wants us to touch human misery, to touch the suffering flesh of others. He hopes that we will stop looking for those personal or communal niches which shelter us form the maelstrom of human misfortune and instead enter into the reality of other people's lives and know the power of tenderness. Whenever we do so, our lives become wonderfully complicated and we experience intensely what it is to be a people, to be a part of a people (EG, 269).

The Triduum is our journey with Jesus, our direct encounter with his Death and

Resurrection – the events which are made real every Eucharistic liturgy we celebrate. The Triduum is a peak moment in our liturgical lives that offers us a profound, personal journey with Jesus Christ. It is our path to a deeper experience of being those who can say, "We have seen the Lord" (John 20:25).

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults

The Church does not celebrate the Easter Vigil so that people may be sacramentally initiated. Rather it is because we celebrate the Paschal Mystery at the Easter Vigil that it is appropriate to baptise. The place of Baptism at the Easter Vigil is a privileged place.

Baptism and the Easter Vigil are related in the Paschal Mystery. The Triduum, with the Easter Vigil as its high point, is the preeminent celebration of the Paschal Mystery. We must understand "celebration" to mean more than a joyous commemoration. It is also a deep meditation on all facets of the mystery. Each year we are called through Lent and the Triduum to experience the Paschal Mystery more deeply. It takes forty days to prepare and three days to experience.

Baptism has a privileged place in the Easter Vigil liturgy because "baptism recalls and makes present the paschal mystery itself..." (Christian Initiation, "General Introduction", 6) All the mighty deeds of God that we celebrate in word and song, from the creation of the universe to the Passion and Resurrection of Jesus, are refocused on the elect. God's salvation happened not only in the past; it happens now. And we get to see it "in real-time". The saving power of Christ's Paschal Mystery is experienced in Baptism of the elect, and it happens in our midst!

The liturgy as presented in The Roman

Missal underscores quite clearly the privileged position Baptism holds in the Easter Vigil. The Vigil includes the "Third Part: Baptismal Liturgy" whether an elect is present for Baptism or not. The faithful's renewal of baptismal promises is included in this part of the Easter Vigil. There is no part entitled "Completion of Initiation Liturgy"; none entitled "Reception into Full Communion Liturgy". There is no part of the liturgy that gets substituted in or out depending on who's present. It is cautioned against seeing this omission as an accidental oversight. The Vigil wants to celebrate the grandiosity of God's saving grace of the cosmic scale of creation and on the intimate scale of the individual. For the individual, this grace is won in Baptism. And it is won in Baptism whether one is baptised in the Catholic Church or in any other Christian Church. The candidate for Reception into Full Communion has already been incorporated in the Paschal Mystery. Their path as a disciple may warrant celebration, but reception and completion of Initiation are simply not of the same theological magnitude as Baptism.

This does not negate the possibility that wise pastoral decisions may include the initiation of these persons in the baptismal liturgy. But it does negate the presupposition that these non-baptismal initiations should always be included. In fact, it presupposes the opposite: that only those who need Baptism will be initiated at Easter Vigil. The RCIA is remarkable in Catholic history for its flexibility to pastoral needs. It would be misunderstanding the Church's desire for authentic pastoral care not to make use of that flexibility when necessary and when allowed. But we must watch carefully the assumptions that we bring to our pastoral decision-making. It we do not, we risk nothing less than our understanding of the Paschal Mystery.
